The premium is given for any Year 7 pupils who are recorded in the Key Stage 2 assessment data as not having achieved the expected levels of reading or mathematics. The funds are primarily aimed at improving Maths and English levels.

Sixteen pupils at Longridge High School met the criteria for the funding in the year 2015 - 2016. This short report summarises how funding was spent.

- To provide appropriate and personalised access to the IDL program/numeracy program with specialist teachers and teaching assistants in lessons.
- To allow the cohort to fully engage with the Accelerated Reader programme to promote and improve literacy skills.
- A Reading Partner scheme – Year 10 pupils support lower ability readers in Year 7.
- Small group intervention reading and numeracy sessions with subject specialist - 2 x 30 minute reading/numeracy sessions per week.
- To purchase suitable reading materials for intervention sessions – low level high interest, non-fiction and dyslexia friendly texts,
- A further small group received additional literacy sessions on spelling and reading with the literacy TA.

Impact Measures

Of the 16 pupils eligible for the Catch-Up premium last year, 8 met the criteria for reading and 7 of them met the criteria for mathematics.
